

2020 HART Awards acknowledge the top contributors to local reconciliation celebrated at National Reconciliation Week virtual awards ceremony

The Victorian Local Governance Association (VLGA) and Reconciliation Victoria have announced the winners of the seventh annual HART Awards – that recognise community and local government contributions to reconciliation – in a virtual ceremony today.

The HART Awards, supported by Bank Australia and Local Government Victoria, recognise local governments and community organisations that are Helping Achieve Reconciliation Together - Aboriginal and non-Aboriginal people working together to build relationships, respect and understanding and which demonstrate a commitment to Aboriginal self-determination.

This year's seventeen finalists showcased the diversity and strength of reconciliation activities across the state – including education initiatives, cultural markers, forums, cultural events and resource development.

VLGA President Cr Lambros Tapinos said:

"In a new twist for the HART Awards this year the award ceremony went virtual. It still had the same air of excitement so it proves that you cannot keep a good celebration down. Especially when it is about reconciliation. The Awards showcase how community and local government can work together for reconciliation. Virtually still powerful and a wonderful way to acknowledge the great work that is being done.
