WHY IS THIS IMPORTANT



I in 5 Australian children will experience unwanted sexual contact before their 18 birthday



I in 4 girls and I in 7 boys will be sexually abused in their life.

- Royal Commission, 2014



I in 33 children received child protection services, with 73% being repeat clients. 250,000 reports abuse and neglect across Australia

- Child Protection Australia, 2015-16



Research tells us that children and young people need to disclose, on average, **5** times before someone will take action.






Over 54,000 children in Australia will not sleep in their own bed tonight because it is not safe to do so.

More infants **under the age of 12 months** were found to be abused than any other age group.




